



Who can sail?


The versatility of sailing allows anyone to participate. The variety of classes and types of activities makes sailing an amazing sport for people of all ages, abilities and ambitions.

How to start forming an inclusive sailing nation

- Make an inventory of your national structure
 - √ sailing
 - √ disabled sports
 - √ disabled sailing
- What is already there? How can you cooperate to share your expertise.
- What is missing: Attitudes, Knowledge, Equipment, physical access to facilities.
- Adapt current or create a pathways structure for sailing in your MNA to include possibilities for sailors with special needs.




Pathway

No "one size fits all" Pathway for sailors with disabilities.


Choice of classes sailed / recommended – training & racing opportunities

A great place to start to take a complete grip on inclusion.



Emerging nation or established MNA

- Consider inclusiveness in all aspects of developing your programme / MNA from the beginning.
- Add an "Disability awaress related to sailing" module to all training – instructors to race officials.
- Choose/ add developing classes that suits a broad spectre of sailors
- Make sure facilities have basic accessibility to walkways, jetties, toilets, social areas etc.
