Lewes Yacht Club did an excellent job organizing the World championship. The great deal of preparation put into the event was obvious throughout the week. They had an extremely helpful and friendly crew to help with the sailors needs. There were abundant race committee and crash boats on the water, and because of the terrible weather conditions, they were certainly needed.

(6) VENUE GOOD & BAD POINTS?

- ASHORE:

Lewes Yacht Club is a beautiful facility, with a large dining room upstairs for social functions and a lower level for skippers meetings and protest hearings. Every morning, members of the club served excellent, healthy breakfasts, and passed out lunches for the sailors to take out to the course. Dinners were served in the dining room and were restaurant quality. Because the weather did not cooperate, there was a great deal of downtime, while waiting for the wind to subside. One of the days that it was obvious that we would not be able to sail, the club members organized a trip to the Annapolis Boat Show, at no cost to the sailors. The trip was a big hit and sailors from around the world got to see the beautiful City of Annapolis.

- AFLOAT:

Normally, Lewes is a great sailing venue. The strong current makes for great tactical sailing. Unfortunately, the entire week, with the exception of the Sunday practice race, was stormy. The strong Northerly breeze pushed huge waves o nto the beach, making launching extremely difficult and even dangerous. Several boats were damaged while sailors attempted to launch. During the first race, thunderstorms rolled through and all subsequent races were cancelled. The next day, races were completed in extremely windy conditions in the morning, followed by a dying breeze in the afternoon. The lines seemed to be fairly square and the courses were set properly. However, extremely stormy weather returned and no more sailing was possible for the week - it was just too stormy to sail in. If it were not for the storm that sat over the mid Atlantic for the week, it would have been a great World Championship.
