- Monitor and develop all technical aspects of Windsurfing & Kiteboarding in conjunction with relevant ISAF Committees



Committee's Current Work / Projects

- Support the implementation of Councils decision to add kiteboarding to SWC
- Support the permanence of Windsurfing in Youth Olympics
- Support the permanence of Windsurfing in ISAF Youth Worlds
- Support the permanence of Windsurfing in the Olympic Games
- Support the introduction of Kite boarding in the Olympic Games



Committee's Current Work / Projects

- Support and foster youth and women recruitment
- Collaboration with Equipment Comm. through member representative, in particular in relation to new rules concerning new equipment for Olympic and ISAF Championships
- Continue to study and to contribute to the development of racing rules for kite and windsurfing in collaboration with the Rules Comm.
- Establish partnership with Development and Youth Committee to introduce coach training programs



Working Parties

- Equipment and Format Working Party to study equipment and format alternatives and prepare submissions for the adoption of windsurfing and kiteboarding at Olympic Games and SWC
- Youth and Women Development Working Party to study and implement development of youth and women recruitment across all classes, including setting up a fund to finance youth participation and coaching at World Championships in conjunction with Development and Youth Comm.



Priorities for 2013 - 2016

- Work towards implementation of Kiteboarding participation at all SWC events
- Work towards both Windsurfing & Kiteboarding being in the Olympic Sailing Competition
- Work on developing youth recruitment programs for windsurfing and kite

- Kite and windsurfing medals at 2020 Olympic Games
- Increase participation numbers for youth and women across all classes and divisions
