A submission from the Chairman of the Racing Rules Committee

Purpose or Objective

To update Case 132 as a consequence of the approval of Submissions 149-19 and 163-18.

Proposal

Edit Case 132 as follows:

CASE 132

Rule 16.2, Changing Course

Rule 18.1(a), Mark-Room: When Rule 18 Applies

Rule 42.3(e), Propulsion: Exceptions

Interpretation of the phrase 'on a beat to windward'.

Question

Rule 16.2 states that it applies between boats on opposite tacks on a beat to windward. Rule 18.1(a) states that rule 18 does not apply between boats on opposite tacks on a beat to windward.

For the purpose of <u>these rules rule 18.1(a)</u>, when are boats <u>on opposite tacks</u> on a beat to windward?

Answer

For the purpose of rule 18.1(a), which is only needed in multi-boat situations when at least one boat is in the zone, two


<u>Two</u> boats on opposite tacks are considered to be on a beat to windward

- (1) when the proper course for each of them is-would, in the absence of all other boats, be close-hauled or above, or
- (2) when one or both of them have overstood the are overstanding a close-hauled layline to the their next mark and are sailing below close-hauled.


Delete question and answer 2 about the application of rule 42.3(c).


Consider the following four situations, each involving boats on opposite tacks in the zone of a mark to be left to port. The mark could be a windward mark, a finishing mark at the port end of a finishing line, a windward gate mark, or a limit mark that is not a rounding mark. In each of these situations, the boats shown are 'on opposite tacks on a beat to windward' and, therefore, rule 18 does not apply between them.

In each of the situation diagrams that follow, the boats shown are on opposite tacks on a beat to windward approaching the next mark of their course. This mark may be a rounding mark, a passing or limit mark, a gate mark or a finishing mark.




<u>Situations 5 and 6 illustrate two boats on a beat to windward in the zone of a mark to be left to port.</u> In situation 5 condition (1) applies and in situation 6 condition (2) applies.





<u>In situation 7 each pair of boats in the diagram below is on a beat to windward and the starboard-tack boats are each subject to rule 16.2.</u>

Submission: 040-20 Cont'd

Reasons

1. Submission 149-19 added the words "a beat to windward" to rule 16.2 and an interpretation is required to clarify the application of the rule. Previously the rule applied on all legs of a course.

- 2. Submission 163-18 deleted the words "Except on a beat to windward" from rule 42.3(c) so that the case is no longer relevant to this rule.
- 3. The interpretation of "on a beat to windward" in rule 18.1(a) required editing when a boat is above the close-hauled layline.
